# What Changes Us?

Traveling, meeting new people and putting ourselves into new (and difficult) situations can give us a fresh perspective on ourselves.

Now that we're in the homestretch of the 60th Missouri Photo Workshop, you all have much to be proud of. As you evaluate your 400+ pictures you should feel good that you have made some terrific images. That in itself is very rewarding.

But I wonder, are your pictures different, as Duane Dailey said they would be in his Sunday night remarks? Have you created another way or two of approaching the world photographically?

Maybe it's too soon to know exactly how we've all changed and grown, but my sense is that the experiences you have had this week are firmly planted in your being, and that they will grow and mature. How we see the world is important; how we see ourselves and relate to other people is more important. We hope the workshop has provided the challenge we promised you.

Workshop emeritus co-director Bill Kuykendall uses the metaphor of learning to play a musical instrument in talking about becoming a better photographer - that practice, lots of practice, enables us to grow as musicians, er, as photographers. How will you practice your photography when you return to your home turf?

And, how can you use what you've learned in your dealings with your fellow photographers, editors, students - and teachers? We hope that what we think of as the "honest" approach to photography will pervade your spirit, that you realize that the pictures you make are an affirmation of the people you photograph, and that the photograph is a document that deserves the authenticity we often presume it has. Let's make it so.
